



FROM THE REV. ALVAN BIRKETT, RECTOR OF CHESHAM BOIS 1945—1964

Most gladly do I send a commendation of this brochure. It is such a joy to me to have been privileged to play a small part in eighteen of the 750 years that are being commemorated. To be associated with any church is a great privilege; but if that church can look back on centuries of existence, there seems to be a special atmosphere about it.

St. Leonard's began its life in 1215, the famous Magna Carta year, when our land was seeking freedom of thought and action in Church and State. Those must have been stirring days. It seems to have begun as a Private Chapel to the Manor House of that time. Later the family gave it as a Parish Church for the district. With the growth of the neighbourhood the building has changed from time to time to meet the needs of the increasing population. But the spot where it stands has been holy ground on which God has been honoured for three-quarters of a millennium.

From a Private Chapel to a Parish Church—in that bit of its history seems to lie a healthy suggestion for carrying on its work in this 20th century. We build upon well laid foundations. Although we are privileged to enjoy what others have provided, we are not meant merely to enjoy our inheritance. We are to extend the Kingdom of God in Chesham Bois.

In the New Testament we read of "the church in thy house". The Christian Church began "in the homes", not in buildings set apart for worship. In their houses they talked of God and prayed to God. Children grew up feeling the homeliness of God. This aspect

of life has weakened tragically. A Church is strong, and more likely to play its part wisely and well when its members try to remember "the church in thy house" more carefully, and when they are not afraid of their friends and neighbours knowing "God is in this place".

This is a wonderful century in which to be living and to be called on to play some part in it. There is still a great search for freedom which is now world wide. The various bodies of the Christian Church are drawing nearer to each other than they have ever been before. New nations are shaping their new lives. What is it all moving towards? Only God knows the answer. Let us ask for the "understanding heart" that will help us to face the challenge of this 20th century with an unwavering faith and unflinching courage.

CHESHAM BOIS CHURCH

Very attractively situated off Bois Lane, as shown on the map on the back page, St. Leonard's Church is never closed.

The present chancel was the original chapel and preserves much of its 13th century character. Of particular interest are the late 17th century Holy Table, the Jacobean Communion rails, rare chrysom child brass of 1542, early Jacobean oak pulpit with its canopy now serving as a base, and iron hourglass holder from Puritan times.

The church also possesses an Elizabethan silver chalice, and 18th century chalice, paten and almsdish. The parish register dates from 1598.
