

My dear Friends,

I am sorry that I have had to go so slowly during the past few weeks, for it has meant very little visiting indeed, and a general slackening off of other work. I am most grateful to those who have made more rest possible by preaching or taking other services for me. The Rev. C. H. E. Cropper and the Rev. R. G. Milburn have helped me with many services, and Mr. S. W. Fieldhouse very kindly took the Childrens' Church at very short notice. The same helpers are also very kindly making it possible for us to get away for Sunday, June 11th. We hope to get away on June 6th, and we are going to visit some relations at Peppard, and possibly to spend two nights by the river on the way there. It is now rather an inaccessible spot, but you can get there in time by a succession of bus rides.

In May we have welcomed quite a lot of visitors to our Church at the Sunday Morning Services, and we were very glad to have the Parade of the St. John Ambulance on the 7th, and the Home Guard on the 14th. I was sorry that we could not have some youth organisation on Empire Youth Sunday, but as I expected all "organised" youth went to a Church Parade at Chesham in the afternoon, so we had to be content with a very few members of the Chesham Bois Youth Club as addition to the ordinary congregation. However two members of the Club kindly read the lessons, and we were very glad to have them with us. We used the special service arranged by the Church of England Youth Council—a service somewhat on the lines

of the Westminster Abbey Empire Youth Service.

I want once again to ask you to make Trinity Sunday a day of special worship and praise. I have never yet succeeded in making people take a real interest in this Festival, and yet I feel that it should be regarded as a day which sums up all the Festivals and seasons of the Church's year and then bids us worship the God, Who has thus revealed Himself in love to us. The Festival is so overshadowed by Whit-Sunday, and so identified with the difficulties of the Athanasian Creed that people leave it severely alone. I should like something better this year. I shall ask the members of the P.C.C. to communicate together at the 8 a.m. celebration, and the members of the Choir at midday.

We had a very nice service on Ascension Day at 9.10 a.m., for our School children. The lesson was read by one of the scholars and a good number of their,

parents. The school managers were also represented.

NOTICE OF INTERCESSION SERVICES DURING THE "INVASION."

The Archbishops' request that prayer should be made in our Churches directly the "invasion" commences was considered at the P.C.C. meeting. It was decided that a service of Intercession should be held in our Church at 8 p.m., on the day when we hear of this invasion, and that our Church bell should be rung as a warning or summons, at 7.30 p.m. The service will last for about half an hour. Other times will be arranged for meeting to pray at St. Leonard's Hall, as announced. There is always a meeting for Intercession each day at the Free Church School Room at 11 a.m.

## THE CONFIRMATION.

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# THROUGH THE MISSIONARY WINDOW.

Ascentiontide is not only a call to service but it is a challenge. The whole missionary field-home and overseas-is one. The problems to be solved now are terrific, the field vast, yet we do long to do something to meet the world's needs. A special responsibility rests on the Christian Churches to help non-Christian lands.

In the Evening Standard recently, a paragraph, containing news of West African natives who are fighting side by side with our men in Burma, gave a letter from a tribal chief. ". . all your wives and brothers are well. They are buying fowls to give to their fetishes so that you will all be kept well. I myself am sacrificing daily to the fetish for your safety and the early and successful conclusion of the war."

The Church is in the best position to infuse, into the changing outlook, that sense of spiritual values. Let us feel a real sense of fellowship with the world and pray that our Lord's message at Ascention-tide may be carried "to the uttermost part of the earth."
