

1042-66 In the reign of King Edward the Confessor *CHESHAM BOIS MANOR*, assessed at 1½ hides, was held by two **sokemen**, one a man of **Earl Leofwin** and the other of **Earl Harold**.




1086 the manor had passed to the **Bishop of Bayeux**, who held it in demesne. As in Weston
Turville, the manor passed to the **Earls of Leicester**,
who subinfeudated it, and it was held of the honour of
Leicester and afterwards of the duchy of Lancaster,
the overlordship being last mentioned in 1645.

1339 Chesham was assigned to his widow Margaret in dower, his daughter and heir Joan being a minor.

1334 John Brianzon comes of age. 1340 Joan Brianzon's title to the manor appears to have been ignored to satisfy the demands of Sir John de Moleyns, who obtained such extensive grants of lands in Buckinghamshire at this period, for he was in possession in 1340.

1350 Sir John de Moleyns conveyed Chesham Bois to William de Hanampstede, grocer and citizen of London. 1365 Peter de Braose was still living in 1365, but some time after this date the manor passed to the family of Winslow.

1392 John Winslow presented to the church. 1430 July, commission of oyer & terminer set up to investigate widespread complaints of oppressions, extortions, assaults and injuries committed by Thomas & John Cheyne. In September the Cheynes are indicted for robbery, embracery, and perverting the course of justice. The alleged crimes all took place in and near the manor of 'Maudeleyns' in Northchurch, which bordered the Cheyne's property in Chesham, and point to a major dispute over title to the manor. Even so, the brothers were acquitted in the King's bench.
